I have two examples of clericalism:

The first one was years ago when I was a member of a parish prayer group.

Two of us visited a member of the parish who could not receive the sacraments because she had married a second time while her first husband was still alive. She offered an opinion about the Eucharist that was rather strange but seemed logical at the time. I asked her if she wanted to see a Priest and she said yes. The Associate pastor visited her and spoke to her. I defended her position and the prayer group was shut down. I was 19 at the time and said whatever came to mind. Afterwards, it dawned on me that I was not the one with training in theology and that the priest was probably right. It never occurred to me to go back and tell him he was right. He probably thought he had stopped a nest of heretics.

A few years later a theologian (I forgot his name) declared that Jesus was not divine. Pope John Paul II silenced him and forbade him from teaching in the Church. This is kind of a no brainer and the theologian got what he deserved.

The Church hierarchy makes every effort to protect the laity from making errors in teaching and this has led to control and a passive laity. If we go from maintenance to mission and on to evangelical pursuits then it will only be a matter of time before it scares the hierarchy and some action is taken. This could cause some to leave the Church. I do not have an answer for this except to trust the Holy Spirit. We had it really good when Bishop Sheen was doing the preaching. Maybe we need a more publicly active Apostolic. Then the laity can follow.

First of all, I am somewhat puzzled by your reason(s) for bringing up the issue. I think many (most?) Catholics accept that clericalism is part and parcel of the Catholic Church. It's probably one of the root causes of Protestantism. For my part, it's generally no more (or less) significant (or onerous) than the machinations of the hierarchy in any large organization. The only manifestations that give me pause are the exclusion of women and married men from the priesthood. I guess I am also bothered by specific instances, such as the actions of the Canon Law courts in granting some annulments (e.g., Newt Gingrich, et al). Beyond that, I don't give clericalism much thought.

More puzzling, though are the comments of Mirus regarding "clerics lite," and most puzzling of all was the emphasis you added to his "on the third hand" comments by underscoring that segment of his comments.

I think many of us think our personal spiritual life is not sufficient, and choose to express further our roles as Catholics by participating in the "ministries within the church building." I'm probably one of those "third hand" people. And so be it.

I'm probably misunderstanding this whole issue - but "so be it" to that, as well.

We feel His love, and He fills us with His love during this time. Those who make a regular Holy Hour say it is the most peaceful time of their week and they leave refreshed. Jesus invites each of us: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Mt11:28) Blessed Anne of St. Bartholomew said, "Silence is precious; by keeping silence and knowing how to listen to God, the soul grows in wisdom and God teaches it what it cannot learn from men."

Turn back to Him as often as needed.
