

I want you to begin to imagine what an **Intentional Parish** would really look like. In the six years that I have been very blessed to be at St. Paul, I have observed significant growth in our movement toward being an **Intentional Parish**.

Next month's word is Perception. This week, I began to ask myself anew, what my Perception of an **Intentional Parish** is, and let me say it opened all sorts of reminders and remembrances for me. One of my immediate responses was to go back and review some of the documents of Vatican II. The documents were pretty freshly off the press when I entered Seminary, and our study of these documents was a significant part of our curriculum. There was a great hopefulness and anticipation about how these documents could renew the church.

There were two documents in particular that I wanted to look at because in my opinion they were documents that oozed with enthusiasm for the emerging church:

1) Dogmatic Constitution on the Church (Lumen Gentium-Light of all Nations)

2) Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World (Gaudium et spes- The Joys and Hopes)----Sadly the hopes are still unfulfilled!!

In (#1 above) the church speaks very eloquently on the family as "The Domestic Church". The document says, *Parents have the pastoral responsibility to evangelize, to teach, and catechize their own children, to promote the sacraments, and to work with the larger church, the Parish, in the spiritual growth of their whole family.*

Just imagine how that would look ---parents being the primary witnesses, teachers and instructors of their children, and the Parish Church, its Priests, and its members being the secondary and supportive teachers and witnesses! I think we *have not* captured that perspective very well and it keeps us from being **Intentional Parish**.

In (#2 above) the document boldly proclaims this hope:

"Hence this second Vatican Council, having probed more profoundly into the mystery of the Church, now addresses <u>itself without hesitation</u>, not only to the sons of the Church and to all who invoke the name of Christ, <u>but to the whole of humanity</u>. For the Council yearns to explain to everyone how it conceives of the presence and activity of the Church in the world of today.

Therefore, the Council focuses its attention on the world of men, the whole human family along with the sum of those realities in the midst of which that family lives. It gazes upon that world which is the theater of man's history, and carries the marks of his energies, his tragedies, and his triumphs; that world which the Christian sees as created and sustained by its Maker's love, fallen indeed into the bondage of sin, yet emancipated now by Christ. He was crucified and rose again to break the strangehold of personified Evil, so that this world might be fashioned anew according to God's design and reach its fulfillment.

It would be fair to say that we have not done so well "in the theater of man's history" with his/her tragedies and triumphs.

Take a moment to imagine an **Intentional Parish**. What other marks would identify it as an **Intentional Parish**? When I hear the words, **Intentional Parish**, I see:

- A. Eucharistic Celebrations that are joyful, uplifting and engaging—congregation actively participating.
- B. **Programs of instruction and Catechesis for adults** where the members are engaged in their personal growth and spiritual development.
- C. Hospitality- where people are committed to knowing more than their own circle.
- D. Effective Outreach-It's hard to be an Intentional Parish without effective outreach.
- E. Special attention to the poor, the sick and suffering, the lonely, the exiles.
- F. Promoting effective families— "Domestic Church"
- G. Evangelizing- spreading the Good News, The Joy of the Gospel (Pope Francis)
