# following CHRIST a seven-week experience

## Making myself ACCESSIBLE to God isn't always easy!

Contemplative Prayer. It sounds very simple at first.....be silent and still. I long to be silent and still, and to not always be so busy. I can do this. I can make myself ACCESSIBLE to God.

Then, I give it a try and it feels like the most difficult thing I have ever tried. An attempt at contemplative prayer might be a little intimidating for some at first. We close our eyes, and try to be still, emptying our mind of all thoughts except for those of God. But then, our nose begins to twitch. We start thinking about people we haven't be in touch with. We go over our "to-do" lists, and so on. It can be quite difficult.

Over and over we can lose focus on God; we are taking over the process! We may think, "Should I even try again? Maybe my life/my mind is just too cluttered to be ACCESSIBLE to God." But, many teachers of Contemplative Prayer assure us that even *trying* is a good and positive step to being in union with God. Just wanting to be ACCESSIBLE to Him is indeed a form of prayer. Acknowledging that He is there inviting you, and that you want to accept His invitation is a great start! Fr. Thomas H. Green, SJ wrote, "The very desire for God is a clear sign of His presence."

Writer Charles Wolford understands the complexity of trying to be still after he spent a weekend at Gethsemani Abbey in Kentucky, once the home to Thomas Merton, Trappist Monk, famous author and mystic. Wolford was curious about Gethsemani and decided to leave behind the noise of modern life and experience the silence. He had heard that anyone can be a retreatant and stay a weekend (or a full week) at the abbey free of charge. So he emailed them, and was invited to stay there Memorial Day weekend. Wolford writes of his experience in *Louisville Magazine*, August 2016:

"The abbey seemed placed inside a crown of hills that I later learned were the Nelson County Knobs furred with trees and ringing the horizon. A path led from the parking lot between a yard of tombstones and merged into a plaza that approached the main church, which glowed pale in the evening light. A sign on a wall read: Monastic Grounds. Next to it, a cast-iron gate with letters build into the crest: GOD ALONE."

Wolford was checked into his room at 8:00 pm. This was not a guided retreat so he was left completely alone — "without internet for the first time in as long as I could remember, I had nothing to do."

Within an hour, he had already become restless. "By 9 p.m., I had taken a shower, done 50 push-ups, jotted a paragraph in my journal, read a chapter in the novel I had brought, texted my friends till they stopped texting back, and was sitting at the desk near the window, staring again out toward my car. I had come here, in part, to escape the roar of modern life. But now that I was here, in a enclave of silence, I was almost scared." So he left the monastery for a few hours and drove into town to be with noise and people.

By his second evening there, Wolford was still struggling with the silence and being alone. At one point he wanted to start yelling "to shatter the tranquility that oppressed this building." He resisted yelling, and resisted leaving the premises once again. Instead, he went for a walk, climbed to the top of a hill and observed, "Looking back toward Gethsemane, I knew that something inside me was changing. For the first time since I'd arrived, I was calm. I wasn't thinking about what I was thinking about. I was just there."

When his weekend was up, Wolford had embraced the atmosphere and actually hated to leave. He received these wise words from Brother Paul at Gethsemani, "God is the only thing big enough for our minds, and our minds are not big enough for him. The more you untangle it, the more complicated things are. So what you want to do is enter that simplicity of mind — the simplicity of God." As Thomas Aquinas said, "God is the simplest being of all."

We don't need to travel to an abbey to be ACCESSIBLE to Him. Turn off, tune out, be silent, be still — where you are.
