Fear the Enemy.

Thank you for keeping up with me on these reflections by C.S. Lewis and Saint Paul. How alike they are in many matters regarding Christianity. Paul, in many ways, sees the dichotomy, the fear, the enemy, as being within — a sort of conflict that takes place within himself, and indeed within all of humankind — a conflict between the "Flesh" and the "Spirit." While he acknowledges this conflict as being a part of the life of every human being, he is quite clear that the solution to that conflict is a personal relationship with God.

C.S. Lewis sees the conflict as being between the "Animal Self" and the "Diabolical Self."

Neither author acknowledges that going to church or saying prayers is a solution.

Both see the only solution is a personal trust, belief, and relationship in the Living

God — Father, Son, Holy Spirit.

Notice how Saint Paul presents it:

"We know that by turning everything to their good God co-operates with all those who love him, with all those that he has called according to his purpose. They are the ones he chose specially long ago and intended to become true images of his Son, so that his Son might be the eldest of many brothers. He called those he intended for this; those he called he justified, and with those he justified he shared his glory.

After saying this, what can we add? With God on our side who can be against us? Since God did not spare his own Son, but gave him up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that he will not refuse anything he can give. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! He not only died for us — he rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand he stands and pleads for us." Romans 8:28-34

Here is how C.S. Lewis presents it:

"If anyone thinks that Christians regard unchastity as the supreme vice, he is quite wrong. The sins of the flesh are bad, but they are the least bad of all sins. All the worst pleasures are purely spiritual: the pleasure of putting other people in the wrong, of bossing and patronizing and spoiling sport, and backbiting, the pleasures of power, of hatred. For there are two things inside me, competing with the human self which I must try to become. They are the Animal self, and the Diabolical self. The Diabolical self is the worse of the two. That is why a cold, self-righteous prig who goes regularly to church may be far nearer to hell than a prostitute. But, of course, it is better to be neither."


