CHAOS by: Mary Alford

My name is Mary Alford. I am responding to Fr. Gerry's invitation to share my word that describes 2020 and connects my experiences with the Nativity story.

My word is **chaos**, meaning complete disorder and confusion. My chaos started when the pandemic caused everything to shut down. As a classroom teacher for 3-4 year old special needs children, this caused quite a bit of chaos in my life. All of a sudden we were having to make several weeks' worth of lesson plans, copies of worksheets, art projects (and all the pieces to make them) to give out packets to our students, all while practicing Covid safety guidelines. Then we met daily with out student for virtual lessons. It is difficult to keep the attention of a 3-4 year old special needs child virtually, even with their mother beside them.

Just as that started to calm down, the chaos started at my house. One day I flushed the toilet in our master bathroom and water started pouring out of the bottom of our toilet. We turned off the water and called a plumber. He told us that we were holding water under our foundation and that we had to have the foundation repaired before the plumbing can be fixed. We proceeded to get the loan approved, and the foundation repair took place over a five day period. We then contacted the plumbers that they recommended to follow up for repairs.

The plumber said he would need to drill 3 holes through the foundation to make repairs and could finish it in 3 days. That's where the chaos worsened. The repairs were not completed until 6 weeks later. They kept finding more breaks and putting off our repairs and ended up drilling 6 holes through the foundation in 3 different rooms and cut two huge holes in the walls of the house. Our bedroom furniture was relocated throughout the house, concrete dust was covering everything (despite the plastic sheeting) and we were down to one bathroom for the whole family for at least 2 months while all sheltering at home. The plumber went over the estimate by \$2,000.00. We were anxious and worried about how to cover the extra cost and pay college tuition for our middle child. If that wasn't enough, we also had our microwave go out, I broke my middle toe and the heat quit working in our house (right after the first really cold snap) and we were told we had to have a new furnace 2 weeks before Christmas. Next, the heat went out in my car. After finishing repairs on the floors that they drilled through, we discovered that water was still leaking out from under our house. Turns out, after going back and forth with the plumbers for several weeks, that they tied all of the new pipe they ran into the old broken pipe instead of the new pipe. We are still waiting for that repair to take place. It just seemed like a never ending chain of stressful events kept happening.

Throughout all of this, there was a lot of anxiety and worry, but I kept telling myself that God is in control and that He always provides for us. He helped us navigate all of the chaos and came out okay.

I thought about how this relates to the Nativity story. Mary and Joseph certainly had to deal with a lot of chaos in their life. Mary had an unplanned pregnancy and Joseph had to decide what to do about that. Then they had to have the baby in a stable and become refugees in a strange place with a newborn. That kind of makes my home repairs pale in comparison. However, because of their faith in God, they were able to handle the chaos. They knew God had a plan and trusted in Him.

Due to the pandemic and the political issues we have been having, our world is in chaos right now. I think we all have to remember to trust that God has a plan and trust that He will get us through the chaos. I will leave you with this verse from the bible.
