The Church as a Hospital

Before we moved into our Lenten Season, I shared a quotation with you from an author named James Kennedy. He was a Methodist Minister and was very engaged in Forward Movement Publications, serving as its director for 13 years. In 1957, James spent a great deal of time on the Holy Island of Lindisfarne. There he penned his wonderful book, "Holy Island." The book is a compilation of daily reflections for all 40 days of Lent.

I delighted in going back to the book (which is long since out of print) and following with him the 40-day Lenten journey that he presented so well. After 60 years, his daily reflections have lost none of the luster, and his reflections are as relevant today as the day he wrote them.

I would like to spend some time with you between now and Pentecost, reflecting on the following quotation from the book for the fifth Wednesday of Lent:

"The church, often described as a hospital contains too many patients who fail to get well. The church, often described as a school contains too many pupils who fail to learn. Is this the church's witness to the world? Sick and ignorant disciples who know not the Christ whom they claim as Lord?"

I would like to hear your thoughts and reflections on this quotation, and share this dialogue with you on the front of the bulletin during this great Easter Season.

Our Holy Father Francis likes to speak of the Church as a kind of "field hospital" where members need to be treated and attended to before being sent back out to mission. But, what if we have too many patients who fail to get well? Are we just going to die? Is the Church as we know it going to die?

Can we look at ourselves honestly and truthfully, and gain greater awareness of where each of us fits into this conundrum?

Three years ago, I left our priests' retreat on the Wednesday to meet my good friend, Fr. Ruane at St. Dominic Hospital to meet with the oncologist. After the preliminary introductions, the doctor asked very directly, "Do you want me to sugar-coat this, or do you want me to be very direct?" He chose the feel-good, placebo option. I reminded him, after our meeting, that he would soon have to choose the other option because that is the only way we could proceed with some semblance of effectively moving forward. He agreed that we would have to do that, but just a little later.

I feel like we all have a special affinity, or attraction, to the feel-good, placebo affect — especially when it comes to our Church. As we pray for a renewed outpouring of the Holy Spirit between now and Pentecost, let us pray for the gift of courage for ourselves, that we may reflect deeply on the questions and issues of our Church. Let us reflect seriously on the above quotation, and share with each other our perspectives for a brighter future.

Let us examine our own community here at St. Paul — viewing ourselves as a hospital / as a school! Who are the patients / students? Is it me, or just them — the tragically broken, the big sinners? Do I see the school / hospital as "them" or "us"?

Do I see my own need for healing? Or, am I content with placebos of feel-good faith? Am I here out of obligation or choice? It makes a huge difference!

If I don't want the treatment, why am I here? Guilt? Shame? Worry? Obligation?

- Is it possible for me to be healthy if these are my reasons for being here?
- Is it possible for me to grow freely if obligation is my primary connection?
- Is it possible for me to grow if I am participating mainly because I am afraid to NOT be here?

Can I earn my way into the Kingdom? Do I desire to be in His Kingdom? What signs in my life point to that?

Let us journey together during these 50 days, reflecting on these important questions and on the Holy Island quotation. May it stimulate us and our lives and our relationship with Him. Please share with me in this dialogue! —Fr. Gerry
