December 16, 2018 Third Sunday of Advent ~ Gaudete Sunday

Is IT A PENANCE SERVICE? IS IT A RECONCILIATION SERVICE? OR, IS IT SOMETHING ELSE?

As we prepare for our Annual Advent Service, how do you perceive it? Is it about Penance or Reconciliation? Naturally, there are those who might say, "Who cares? Just let me go to Confession and get on with it!" Still others might be inclined to say, "Look, forget all the talk! Just give me the Absolution and I'll be on my way!" Every now and then, throughout my years of priestly ministry, parish members have asked me, "Which is the correct term, *Penance* or *Reconciliation*?"

These past few weeks, as I have participated in a number of these communal services for both schools and parish communities, I have had the opportunity to reflect on the above questions.

The Church has, over a period of time, used the words almost interchangeably — it may be swayed by the bishop's perspective in a local diocese, or the pastor's perspective in a local parish. The year before I was ordained, (1975) The New Rite of Penance became available, promulgating the beautiful reflections of the Council Fathers (Vatican 2).

The opening decree in it's introduction says:

"In this new rite, besides the Rite for Reconciliation of Individual Penitents, a Rite for Reconciliation of Several Penitents has been drawn up to emphasize the relation of the Sacrament to the Community."

This was a significant departure from the days of yore, where there was an inordinate emphasis on the individual expression of personal sins, penance to be undertaken by the individual, and then absolution — all done in private usually in the confessional-box.

Thankfully, things have changed..... greatly. It is as if we have brought the sacrament out of the darkness and into the light. What a great sacrament it is! Sadly, it is one of our 'best kept secrets.'

Alcoholics Anonymous has captured the value of that practice since their inception in 1935. They believe that the only way to freedom from faults, failings, and sins is 'an honest inventory of self. Then freedom comes through a sharing with myself, my God, and one other living human being.

The secret was out! But it was enormously challenging work, and not all were built for such challenging work, or willing to risk such vulnerability in order to have freedom.

In truth, this was really nothing more than what Jesus was inviting each of us to in the first place. But we were afraid. Check the first book of the Bible Genesis! God appears to Adam in the garden.

"Where are you?" He asked. "I heard the sound of You in the garden," he replied. "I was afraid because I was naked, so I hid." "Who told you that you were naked?" He asked. Nakedness before God is not a bad thing — before people it can be really bad, because it can be used against you.

With God it is radically different. He desires my restoration, not my demise. Every time I am reconciled, God restores me to the Grace of my Baptism, my likeness to Him, and my Communion in Him.

God is all about restoring me to Sonship / Daughterhood, every time I choose to be reconciled with Him. That is why we sometimes are invited to sprinkle ourselves with the Holy Water after Reconciliation, to celebrate that He has once again restored us to our original innocence and likeness to Him.

Perhaps we should call this the Sacrament of Restoration. Then, our gathering would be known as our "*Advent Restoration Service*." Why not? It sure appears to be much more in keeping with His Plan! We offer Him what He most wants from us the gift of our Sin!

How can my sin be a gift to God?

I can gift my sins, placing them before Christ — like the Magi gifted gold, frankincense, and myrrh — box them, own them, name them, offer them with my whole heart to Him in the humble stable. This is what He wants. He wants us to give Him what weighs us down so that He may free us of those burdens. He is not going to wrestle them away from us. He merely invites us to let go of them, and be aware of the fact that He has taken them on Himself.

Our Savior, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace chose to come into the world — to come to us — as a tiny baby, humble and vulnerable, needing His mother's loving care to grow Him. Because He came, lived, and died as man, our sins may be born anew in the Christmas stable. These are gifts because He desires abundant goodness for us. He does not want us to be weighed down dwelling on our sins. If I cling to them, He will not take them from me. When we offer them to Him freely, He lovingly releases their hold on us. He refreshes us with His infinite Mercy and goodness.

Let us take the Examination of Conscience to heart. Really search our lives and bring to Him our sins as gifts to be born into newness, so that we are ready for His coming. Can I allow Him to be born in *my* stable? We have been studying and pondering this past week, that it is good to prepare for His coming to us at Christmas, but it is especially good to prepare for being with Him for eternity.

To prepare for this Christmas Gift Exchange at our Advent Restoration Service, let us first prepare a list. Check it twice. Let's offer that to Him this Season!
