




### Continuing our Reflection on the Gospel of Matthew

Hopefully, everyone has been able to devote time to reading through Matthew with us. It is so rich to study the Sunday Gospel before we hear it proclaimed at Mass.

This week, we hear Jesus helping His disciples better understand their purpose and the new way of living as a follower of Christ. Matthew's Gospel focuses on how the life of Jesus fulfilled what was spoken by the prophets. Here, in Chapter 5 verses 17-37, Matthew features Jesus' approach to the law. The word *law* translated from the Hebrew word *Torah*, refers to the Ten Commandments, but also refers to a way of life in a covenant relationship with God.

Christians were being accused of abandoning the law at that time. In the ever-changing social conditions, they were having a difficult time understanding that Jesus brings a new way of abiding by the law. He didn't come to undo what had been done, but to bring deeper meaning.

Jesus said.

"Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill." (MT 5:17)

Jesus is saying let's go deeper. He is inviting them, and us, to not get stuck in following rules out of obligation or fear. Let's follow the law out of love! His concern was to enable people to experience the freedom of living the Kingdom experience. The purpose of rules and laws is to live in harmony with one another. We don't need a law to force us to act in kindness and love, do we? The very purpose of our lives is to love. God is love, and He made us to love Him and each other. It's a personal choice to follow Him out of His love for us, and our love for Him.

There were 613 precepts (laws) in the Old Testament. Matthew presupposes those who hear his Gospel have an understanding of the Jewish law. In the Scripture verses this Sunday, Jesus refers to the old teachings saying, "You have heard...." (the rules) and He counters with, "But I say to you...." Jesus isn't saying the laws are wrong. He is opening them up, correcting misinterpretations, and showing that the traditional way of thinking is inadequate.

Jesus said.

"You have heard that it was said to your ancestors, You shall not kill; and whoever kills will be liable to judgment.

But I say to you, whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment."

(MT 5:21-22)

For most of us, the law isn't the reason we don't commit murder. On the surface, this may be an easy commandment to keep. "I would never KILL anyone!" But, anger? Well, that one is a whole lot harder to keep at bay. We can easily kill another's mood and spirit with our anger toward them. So, Jesus brings us into a deeper level of living the Commandment "You shall not kill." He equates it with the more common and relatable experience of anger. He brings it home to a space every human being can relate in their life. Likewise with the commandments on adultery and divorce. These words can sting.

(Read MT 5:27-32)

Broken relationships hurt. Divorce and Adultery are extremes. Maybe we can stand and say we have done neither. But, Jesus brings them deeper to the level of intentions. He offers a new way of looking at our decisions, choices, and priorities. How we are treating one another on a daily basis? It is so much more than merely staying within the parameters of strict laws and perfect ideals. His vision of marriage is a covenant of personal love between spouses reflecting the covenant love between God and His people. How does that look in our lives?

The Word of God really comes alive, and the Lord reveals a message to each of us. We pray for a greater awareness and openness to His Word. Let us listen and seek Him with open hearts.

This week's Gospel closes with the importance of being direct in our speech.

Jesus said.

"Again you have heard that it was said to your ancestors,
Do no take a false oath, but make good to the Lord all that you vow.
But I say to you, do not swear at all....Let your 'Yes' mean 'Yes,'
and your 'No' mean 'No.' " (MT 5:33-37)

Simple and Direct. At that time, Oaths were expressions of power and weren't necessarily lived. Some were empty of meaning — saying one thing, yet doing another. It had become common to swear an Oath on an object, rather than in the name of God. All of creation is from God and is dependent on God. All of creation is a reflection of Him and His great glory.

Jesus clearly says, speak in truth. Live in truth. Then, there is no need for swearing by an Oath. Your word is witnessed by God if you are a believer and follower. Others can trust your word or promise because they know your intention and integrity. What a beautiful way to bring greater meaning to everything we do in our lives.

These are great exercises in breaking down the Scripture and growing with His Living Word:

- Discover the historical context
- Place yourself in the story to better connect with the experience
- Reflect on how it makes you feel
- Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal what the Lord is teaching you in the passage
- Return again and again to prayer, seeking deeper understanding and guidance

# REFLECTION QUESTIONS



- Does my anger or mood sometimes "kill" the energy in the room?
- Do my words and actions hurt others?
- Do I bring my gift to the altar while harboring unreconciled conflicts?
- Do I treat others with respect, even behind their back?
- Do I say what I mean, and mean what I say?
- Do I cater my words to what I think the others want to hear, or out of fear of not fitting in?
- Do I allow God's love to guide my choices?
