Looking Inward

- We begin our Lenten Study a little early in order to be able to cover the whole book, - such as stealing, rape, and murder. We can easily operate in the space of "I am a sinner, but I'm not as bad as that person." But, do we recognize those respectable ones - such as irritability, discontentment, unthankfulness, impatience, and anger? The author invites us to be more aware of how we can easily see fault in others, and in doing so encourages us to turn that judgment back toward ourselves.
- This is what we will be exploring in our Small Groups during Lent. relationship with Him.

For those who for some reason cannot or choose not to sign up with a Small Group, you are welcome to pick up a book from the office and read through the material on your own. That way, we can all be on the "same page" during this Season of Lent. Our daily videos will also follow along with the book study. We are taking a slightly different approach to our video program this year. Rather than asking people to prepare scripted reflections, we will record some candid video clips — sort of a "man/woman on the street" style. We will have a few people after each of the Masses ready with their phone cameras and a question of the week. We ask you to please be open to taking a moment to stop and share your thoughts and reaction to those questions. Each day will feature a montage of very short clips featuring a few responses from various people. No one will have a featured solo in the videos. Therefore we need a lot of people to participate. Your willingness to briefly share 0 your thoughts is most appreciated. We all have different experiences and ideas – every one has something of value to offer! Keep in mind, there are no right or wrong answers. It is just entering into a parish-wide dialogue, and we want your honest reaction to the questions. They won't be theological quizzes or a mini-course on apologetics. Rather, they will be one or two simple questions each week relating to Fr. Gerry's Homily and the Lenten Study. There will be no pressure to participate, but we need about 25-30 people to help us out each week in order to have multiple people each day. Hopefully, no one will have to go twice! You also do not have to be participating in a Small Group, or even have read the book to answer. This material is designed to help get us all thinking and living on a deeper, more meaningful level so that we continue to move from Maintenance to Mission.

Dear Father Gerry,

It began with your question a while ago of who we prayed to more: The Father, the Son, or the Holy Spirit.

I found myself thinking while listening to your homily then, "What does it matter? They are one and the same." It was a question I was happy to dismiss as trivial at the time, or perhaps one that I knew wasn't but did not want to worry about. But it nagged me, so much so that I had to speak with a friend about it. And as fate would have it, she shared with me that her sisters prayed to the Holy Spirit all the time. She even joked that if you asked the Holy Spirit for something, to be prepared to receive – maybe because He's not as busy?

At a time when I was struggling deeply with my own prayer life, I decided to start talking to Him. It turns out, there's a direct correlation between who you address your prayers to and how you pray. As a parent, this should have been pretty evident to me. After all, unlike what some school and doctor's office forms would have us believe, my husband and I are not parent 1 and parent 2; we're collectively simply the parents. No important decisions concerning our children are made, or permissions granted without our mutual consent. And yet, our children, despite their young age, know to approach us differently and for different matters. Because I am mom and my husband is dad.

I go to the Father with my heavy burdens, when I have doubts about His plans, when I am losing my faith in the world. But there has always been a formality in the way I approach Him and restraint in what I feel I can unload on Him. People are dying and suffering, asking Him to help me get through bedtime for three little kids by myself seems selfish and silly in comparison. The Holy Spirit, on the other hand, has opened up a less formal line of communication that has given me the courage to approach Him with burdens big and small. He is not unlike the apps on my smartphone that I don't bother closing and simply leave open in the background because I will use them again several times in the day. I "open" Him in the morning when I wake up, before I let my daughter out of the car to go to school, and pick Him back up after carpool, or at naptime, or while doing laundry, or teaching my kids, and after they have gone to bed. To be clear, I don't feel a lesser degree of reverence for Him. He is fully God after all. But much like my kids not hesitating to come to me with every little thing that happens throughout their day, I, too, am beginning to learn to go to the Holy Spirit with almost everything that happens throughout my day. His response is always instantaneous. He is in the lightness of heart I feel despite a persisting problem; in the absence of anxiety during a very stressful deployment year; in the grace I accept for myself even though I continually fall short as a wife, parent, daughter, and friend; in the spirit of gratitude when motherhood sometimes feels like 90 percent doing chores; and yes, even in the extra 30 minutes of patience I manage to muster at bedtime after a very long day.

As a cradle Catholic who knows a multitude of prayers by heart but has struggled throughout my adult life with the question: How do you talk to God? The answer has been surprisingly simple and obvious: You just do.
