Meet the St. Paul Senior Leadership Team

Today, we hear from Lee -

As a child, I read and learned about politics and the 1960's cultural shifts. I tried to follow the Watergate debacle, the Vietnam War and the abortion movement. Today I am still interested in what shapes society's morality and how we identify ourselves. My Faith journey has taken me through the Baptist, Presbyterian, and Anglican Churches, leading me to the Catholic Church.

Being a Baptist kid, I was taught Bible stories and encouraged (uh, forced?) to memorize Scripture. I enjoyed my friends at church, maybe too much, because I was mischievous. I was inquisitive, asking was told not to be argumentative and behave myself. I became bored with the worship services. They Becoming Presbyterian satisfied a lot of my curiosity until that curiosity waned, because Presbyterians had answers for everything. There were no holy mysteries. Something was missing. Becoming Anglican taught me that being mission-minded was more than giving money to foreign missionaries. It was realizing covered with easy readings (such as Scott Hahn's Rome Sweet Home) and RCIA's blessings.

about people starving in Africa who never hear the Gospel and how can there be exceptions to pro-life. I seemed lacking, except on major holidays. I had no idea what liturgy was or that it was even a word. the mission field was located at work, next door, at Kroger, at the stop light. I also started warming to the idea of evangelism. I knew Jesus commanded me to make disciples of all nations, but I could not understand how to do that comfortably. I began asking God how that would look and sound. I sensed God saying, "Lee, it's all about relationships." The Anglican Church also introduced me to liturgical worship and built a comfort zone for Catholicism. Holy Spirit's guidance to become Catholic in 2017 was a gentle path,

I am excited to be Catholic, in full communion with Christians across the world. I love our liturgical worship. I yearn to be in Mass to kneel, to pray silently and aloud, alone and together, to read Holy Scripture, to meditate, to pass the peace, to sing, and to participate in the Eucharistic feast. But, the stirring voice since childhood is still present. Others do not know Jesus and experience Holy Spirit's comfort. So, my curious nature has prompted me to pray, what should I see and hear, Lord? Again, I sensed God saying, "Lee, it's all about relationships."

Over the years, I have heard (and used) excuses, such as "God will take care of His children" and "not everyone can evangelize," and "leave it to the missionaries to spread the Gospel." But, those and other messages are no longer usable. God is stirring. The Great Commission of "making disciples" applies to friends, neighbors and acquaintances right here in Rankin County. Though many people are different from me outwardly, they are part "of all nations." (MT 28:19) Holy Spirit reminds me we are all parts of one body. I cannot say I do not need other parts (children of God). I do need them. (I Cor 12:15)

At this point in my Faith journey, I did not expect or volunteer to be part of any leadership, especially in this highly clerical structure, the Roman Catholic Church. But, God is stirring. At St. Paul. And, in me. He wants us to share the Gospel message. That Jesus is alive, here for us today, wanting a personal relationship with me. And you! His calling us to evangelism is inspiring when understood, transforming when shared, and tragic when ignored. I serve on the SLT to help fulfill the Great Commission.

Our Church is receiving its own collective nudge to reach out to the unchurched, the former churched, the fallen-away, the lonely and misguided. Those beautiful brothers and sisters we may know at work, in our neighborhoods, and those we may have never met. Here I am, Lord. Take away my defenses. Guard, guide and protect me from evil. I have heard you calling. Send me. Send us.

I hope to remain as inquisitive as when I was child. But, I have no doubt, God wants me at St. Paul, being evangelistic, and serving on SLT. I pray each of us looks upward to follow Jesus and inward to feel Holy Spirit changing our hearts.

Our mission is to invite everyone into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ.





Capital Campaign Pledge Weekend ~ 40 Hours of Adoration
