The Belle of the Ball

The Belle of Amherst is a play written in 1976 by William Luce. The British actress, Julie Harris, played the role of the poet Emily Dickinson whom I mentioned in last week's bulletin, for her observation regarding God and our relationship with Him:

"They say that God is everywhere, and yet we always think of Him as somewhat of a recluse."

The play, a one-woman performance, delves into the life and eccentricities of the poet. In the First Act, the audience is made aware of Emily's issues in regard to religion. She grew up Amherst, Massachusetts, in a household that was rigorous, rigid, and puritanical, in which her father was lord. Although this was a prominent family in the community, Emily lived much of her life as a recluse.

Church attendance was compulsory, and daily prayer exercises a requirement. A spirit of rebellion took hold of the young Emily at one point, and she began to question many of the teachings and customs she had grown up with. While such a rebellion can be very troublesome to some parents, especially parents who have grown accustomed to the placid nature of a son/daughter, this process of pushing out or pushing against is a very healthy process. It is really an important stage of growth/development where one comes to test what they really believe.

I have the feeling that this experience in the life of Emily was very fruitful. While she did generally stay indoors, baking cakes and writing poems late into the night, she makes the following very powerful declaration in the play:

"You see, I have never had to go anywhere to find my paradise. I found it all right here—
the only world I wanted— here in Amherst, Massachusetts. Massachusetts!
Now, there's a word to lift your hat to! Paradise is no journey, because it is written.
But for that very cause, it's the most arduous of journeys. I travel the road into my soul all the time."

What a profound thought — I guess we keep saying it all of the time, the "journey within." But, how many really genuinely make that "most arduous" journey? It is much less threatening, and certainly much less fearful, to make other journeys. The journey within is in essence the great question that we have focused on these 40 Days of Lent, and all of the great questions posed to me (each one of us as individuals) in the material presented so well by Rick Warren in "What On Earth Am I Here For"!! I hope it has really caused you to push out, and push against, many of the thoughts, beliefs, and concepts that are presented, as well as many that you have always held untested.

I find Emily Dickinson to be amazing in the fact that she remained a deeply religious woman throughout her life. Her poetry reveals a great depth (a by-product of questioning) and a keen awareness of God's presence in the world, along with a deep <u>consciousness</u> of the great master of life and death. Emily wrestled with doubts and fears about God and religion, as we all tend to do from time to time.

But, the zenith of her faith comes in the play when she declares:

"I'm sure that no person will be truly happy until that person can say, 'I love Christ." $\,$

That's why we have Easter.

That's why we celebrate this coming week the great mysteries of our Faith!
