When Pride Gets in the Way a Modern Day Parable inspired by Matthew 21:33-43

There was a landowner who opened a snow cone stand on the banks of Pride Lake. All three left the property abruptly and were confused by what had happened.

He represents me, and he is also learning to be a shrewd businessman. This is a simple snow cone stand. Surely, these young summer time employees cannot outsmart him!
